NCDP Kicks Off Statewide Rural Tour in Pasquotank County

The North Carolina Democratic Party kicked off their statewide Rural Tour in Pasquotank County on Monday night with a listening session hosted by NCDP Chair Anderson Clayton. North Carolina has the second largest rural population in the country and under the leadership of Chair Clayton and Second Vice Chair Dr. Kimberly Hardy, the Democratic Party has prioritized outreach and resources to our rural communities. The Rural Tour will take the Democratic platform to rural counties to highlight the results and investments by the Biden Administration, Governor Cooper, and Democrats into every corner of our state.

The Biden Administration oversaw the creation of 443,800 new jobs in North Carolina, including 12,400 manufacturing jobs. Under Trump, North Carolina lost 8,800 manufacturing jobs.

Thanks to President Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, \$9.1 billion is headed to North Carolina to fund 435 projects, creating good union jobs. This spurred a small business boom and has encouraged Black entrepreneurship, with over 492,000 new business applications filed in North Carolina since the start of the administration. Black business ownership has grown at the fastest pace in three decades.

Monday night's kickoff event was in Pasquotank County, which was the only county in the Northeastern corridor of North Carolina that Joe Biden carried in 2020.

President Biden, Governor Cooper, and Democrats secured the following results in Pasquotank County:

- Elizabeth City State University received \$15 Million in investments from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill.
- Thanks to Governor Cooper and Democrats in North Carolina fighting for years to bring Medicaid Expansion to fruition, 2,382 residents in Pasquotank County gained access to lifesaving health coverage in December.
- Due to Republicans using taxpayer money for private schools, Pasquotank County could see a 5% decline (-\$1,708,640) in total state funding for K-12 public education under the expanded voucher program.

Following the release of Governor Cooper's budget proposal, North Carolina Democratic Party Chair Anderson Clayton released the following statement:

"Governor Cooper's budget makes the kind of investments we need to set up North Carolina for a bright future for years to come. It invests over \$1 billion in public

education instead of wasting more money on taxpayer-funded private school vouchers and supports strong economic development to continue our historic growth. Under Governor Cooper's leadership, our state has been the best in the nation for business for two years in a row and this budget sets out a roadmap for how we can continue to lead the nation in clean energy, economic development and investing in our public schools."

NC Policy Update, April 22, 2024

Governance

• In advance of the start of the legislative session on April 24, multiple committees in the NCGA have held hearings with various state agencies. Personnel shortages were a common theme: the health care system and courts system have both struggled to fill positions, and while enough teachers are being hired, the Department for Public Instruction points out that public teaching jobs in North Carolina have an 11.5% attrition rate. Karen Brinson Bell, executive director of the State Board of Elections, mentioned in a hearing that more funding is needed to modernize the State Election Information Management System.

Education Policy

On Wednesday a committee of the UNC System Board of Governors (BOG) voted to approve a policy that would replace the UNC system's current Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) policy. The new policy would remove language about diversity, equity, and inclusion, instead emphasizing "equality" and "commitment to institutional neutrality and nondiscrimination." UNC-Chapel

Hill students who tried to attend the meeting were not allowed in the building, in potential violation of open meetings law. If the policy is approved by the full BOG in its May 23 meeting, many DEI initiatives and job roles across the system may be changed or eliminated by September 1. All current members of the BOG were appointed by Republicans in the state legislature.

Health Care Policy

On Tuesday the NC House Substance Abuse Committee unanimously
voted to add the drug tianeptine to the list of controlled substances. The
highly addictive drug, known as "gas station heroin," is currently available in
convenience stores and vape shops but would be removed from shelves if the
NCGA votes to reclassify it. The FDA recently issued warnings about the drug,
leading to voluntary manufacturer recalls, but because it isn't illegal some stores
have chosen to continue selling it.
