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## Message from CCDP Chair Sue Blalock

As many of you know, the Chatham County Board of Elections was considering not including any Sundays during the early voting schedule for the March 2024 primary. However, they offered an opportunity for public comments and Chatham Dems made their voices heard. Last Tuesday, they voted 3-2 in favor of including one day of Sunday voting (February 25th) in the schedule for early voting during the March primary. The vote was split along party lines, with the Democrats on the Board supporting including one day of Sunday voting and the Republicans on the Board not supporting it. Because the decision was not unanimous, the decision will pass to the State Board of Elections. That Board will convene sometime in December to review all the non-unanimous county Board votes across the state (time and date to be announced). In the past, Chatham Democrats have sent in a lot of letters to the State Board in favor of Sunday voting. When I learn the date of the State Board meeting, I will forward information on where to direct letters.

As a bit of background, during the primary in 2022, only a few more than 300 people voted on the two Sundays included in the early voting schedule (one of those Sundays was Mother's Day). That is the argument for not including a Sunday in the early voting schedule for the 2024 primary. So, assuming that we are successful in keeping Sunday voting in the early voting schedule for the March 2024 primary, the burden will be on us to ensure that it is used.

# North Carolina Republicans Pass Their Partisan Drawn Congressional and Legislative Maps

North Carolina Republicans, with the state supreme court in their favor, unveiled and passed new legislative and congressional maps.

The congressional map would drastically change the congressional delegation from its current 7 Dems- 7 Republicans to a potential 11 Republicans- 3 Democrats scenario. This is one of the most aggressively gerrymandered congressional maps in the country.

# Statement from Governor Cooper:

"Enabled by the State Supreme Court's partisan reversal of constitutional law, Republican legislators have rolled out their latest illegal maps that show gerrymandering on steroids. Drawn in the back room and armed with their new law that keeps their plotting secret, they have used race and political party to create districts that are historically discriminatory and unfair."

## Rep. Reives, House Democrats highlight bad policies from 2023 Long Session

Rep. Reives and House Democrats held a press conference Tuesday to highlight the bad policies enacted over the previous year. Rep. Reives spoke about power grabs, Rep. von Haefen spoke about attacks on bodily autonomy, Rep. Gill spoke about efforts to dismantle public education, Rep. Buansi spoke about bad changes to elections laws, Rep. Morey spoke about attacks on the independent judiciary, and Rep. Harris spoke about policies in the State Budget.

"For five years Governor Cooper was able to keep in check the excesses of one-party rule, but that ended this year," **Leader Robert Reives said.** "Most recently, the General Assembly drew up legislative and congressional maps in secret, cementing their power through gerrymandered maps and preventing North Carolinians from holding them accountable at the ballot box."

#### Toyota announces more jobs for Randolph County

On the heels of Governor Cooper's trip to Tokyo last month to meet with Japanese business executives, Toyota announced they would be increasing the size of their investment at the Randolph County EV battery plant.

Toyota announced an additional \$8 billion of investment, an increase that will yield 3,000 new jobs to the existing 2,000. All told, Toyota will invest \$13.9 billion and create 5,000 jobs for the area.

The Greensboro-Randolph mega-site is located by Liberty. The size of the facility will be 7 million square feet, according to the Triangle Business Journal, which equates to 120 football fields.

## NC Policy Update for 10-30-23

#### Governance

 On Tuesday Republican lawmakers filed an appointments bill replacing most of the Board of Transportation and appointing seven new superior court judges. SB 761 capitalizes on new appointment powers the NCGA took away from the governor and allocated to themselves. Governor Cooper criticized the appointments on Tuesday.

#### Fair Representation

 On Wednesday the NCGA approved new maps for congressional, state House, and state Senate districts. The new congressional map creates 10 solid Republican districts, 3 solid Democratic districts, and 1 district that leans Republican. Four current Democratic U.S. House representatives are now in Republican or Republican-leaning districts. State House and Senate maps also solidify Republican majorities in the NCGA, even in elections in which Democrats win the majority of votes statewide.

## **Education Policy**

- The NC Supreme Court has granted a discretionary review of the Leandro school funding case at the request of Republican legislative leaders. The Leandro decision, which found that North Carolina must adequately fund education across the state, is nearly 30 years old, but it has continued to appear in courts as it is determined what specific funding is required from the state. This represents another issue on which the current NC Supreme Court is willing to reconsider decisions made less than a year ago by the previous NC Supreme Court.
- On Tuesday Governor Cooper announced a plan to allocate \$1.4 million in federal funding for school breakfasts. The funding will be administered through a grant program that school districts and charter schools can apply for, with awards of up to \$50,000 for new or expanded innovative breakfast programs.

## **Environmental Policy**

 On Tuesday Governor Cooper issued an executive order mandating a study of environmental impacts and pollution in poorer areas of North Carolina. The order also calls for the creation of an online environmental justice hub that includes maps showing various environmental justice metrics across the state, creates an environmental justice council that reports to the governor, and requires each state cabinet agency to develop at least three environmental justice goals and measurable outcomes.

## **Kicking Santos Out of Congress**

Now that we've got a Speaker, we're taking votes again. This week, some of our votes were substantive and some were symbolic. Examples of symbolic votes included:

- Reducing the salary of the Director of Bureau of Land Management to \$1
- Reducing the salary of the EPA Administrator to \$1
- Reducing the salary of the Secretary of the Interior to \$1

None of those votes passed.

We also had a vote that combined substantive and symbolic: the expulsion of Rep. George Santos.

There is, of course, strong agreement among just about everyone that he fabricated huge portions of his life story. He is also charged with multiple felonies related to the alleged misuse of campaign money.

I've called on him to resign and I still think he should.

But here's the issue with expelling him this week: The House is doing an ethics investigation into him right now. They've interviewed about 40 witnesses, reviewed over 100k documents, and we are getting a report in about two weeks.

In the history of our country, we have only kicked out five members of Congress. The precedent has been they get some kind of due process before that happens. Getting convicted of a crime involves due process, as does a formal ethics report. But since we don't have either of those things yet, what this vote would have done is change the precedent going forward. The new precedent would be that members of Congress could be expelled before receiving any kind of due process, either internally (ethics investigation) or externally (judicial system).

That would be bad. In my view, it is far better to allow for a process in which the accused has the opportunity to be heard and has some rights.

Skipping due process might feel ok with someone like Santos because he's a bit of an obvious case, but the question posed by the expulsion vote wasn't really about him. To me, it was about whether we wanted to change the threshold for how members can be expelled going forward, and that struck me as a mistake.

It's also completely unnecessary because we can just wait two weeks and do this properly. The ethics committee is preparing their report and having that will allow us to know that we've given him due process, it will leave the existing precedent intact, and I think it will probably end up making the case against him much stronger because of all the evidence they've reviewed.

Which raises the question: Why was this expulsion vote brought now instead of in two weeks, when we'll have the ethics report?

Because there's a group of congressmen in the majority party from New York who are worried about T.V. ads that are going to run in the next election that tie them to Santos. So, as a pre-emptive defense, they are being as aggressive as possible in attacking Santos as often as they can.

Which is fine, I get it, but this week their tactic was to try and skip over due process and expel him before the ethics report comes back, and they did that to make it look like they're really beating him up.

So, the vote failed. He was not expelled - not yet.

I wound up voting against most of my party on this, but I thought it was the right thing to do.

To be clear, I am fine with kicking him out and will vote to do so, but there's no reason to do that before the ethics report comes back.

By the way, for everyone who saw the headlines about people voting not to expel Santos and thought, "What in the world? Why would anyone do that?", I hear you. If all I had seen were the headlines, I would have thought the same thing. It just so happens there was more to the story.

## News from U.S. Senator Thom Tillis
