Good News on March Primary Sunday Voting

I am writing to thank everyone who wrote or otherwise contacted the State Board of Elections on the Sunday voting issue. They received over 300 emails from Chatham County and almost all supported the availability of Sunday voting.

And, I have wonderful news to share. At a special meeting of the Chatham County Board of Elections, the Board voted unanimously to include one Sunday (Feb. 25) in the early voting schedule for the March primary. Because the decision was unanimous, the State Board did not need to consider the issue.

Bottom line: The polls will be open for voting in the afternoon on Sunday, February 25th. Help us spread the word.

ICYMI: North Carolina Democrats Win Big in Municipal Elections, File to Run in Nearly 100% of House and Senate Districts, and Head Into 2024 with More Energy than Ever

North Carolina Democratic Party Chair Anderson Clayton released the following statement:

"As 2023 comes to a close, Democrats across our state have more energy than ever heading into 2024. News from NC Congresswoman Valerie Foushee (North Chatham County's 2024 Democratic Candidate for NC's Fourth Congressional District)

As 2023 comes to an end and I close out my first year in Congress, I'd like to take a moment to highlight some of the work my office has been doing to serve you and the folks across North Carolina's Fourth Congressional District.

2023 BY THE NUMBERS

- Sponsored and cosponsored **203** pieces of legislation.
- Held over **1,100** meetings with constituents, stakeholders, and community leaders.
- Responded to over **13,750** constituent letters.
- Closed **1,091** constituent cases and helped return nearly **\$650,000** owed to constituents from federal agencies.
- Requested over **\$37 million** for 15 Community Project Funding requests that will support critical local projects throughout the district.

LEGISLATIVE HIGHLIGHTS

CLIMATE CHANGE: As a proud supporter of the Green New Deal and as a member of the Sustainable Energy and Environment Coalition, I am working to ensure a cleaner and healthier environment for future generations. Building on current environmental protection laws and bolstering funding to critical agencies and programs, like the National Park Service and the Land and Water Conservation Fund, is key to protecting our natural resources while offering recreational and culturally enriching opportunities across the country. Additionally, I have taken steps towards preventing unnecessary environmental threats in our local communities, including leading my colleagues in urging the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to deny an extension for the Mountain Valley Pipeline Southgate project.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE: As a former administrator for the Chapel Hill police department, I have experienced the importance of solidarity and unity first-hand, as we attempt to create safer communities across the nation. That's why I am proud to collaborate with law enforcement to create a safe and sustainable foundation to

improve community relationships and curb violence within our communities. At the same time, I support long overdue reforms to the criminal and civil justice systems, including the Ending Qualified Immunity Act, Justice for Incarcerated Moms Act, and programs to help support low-income individuals seeking access to legal services.

GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION: As a member of the House Gun Violence Prevention Task Force, I am honored to help lead gun safety efforts within Congress. I have joined over 20 different legislative actions and proposals including efforts to reinstate the federal assault weapons ban, advance vital gun safety measures, ban high-capacity magazines, enforce background checks, and expand research and support for mental health services, hunter gun safety education programs, and community violence intervention programs. I also joined my colleagues in an effort to establish an Office of Gun Violence Prevention to reduce gun violence in our communities, and I am proud to share that this is now a reality thanks to the Biden Administration. Furthermore, alongside House Democrats, I signed discharge petitions to pass the Bipartisan Background Checks Act, the Assault Weapons Ban, Ethan's Law (to ensure safer storage), and legislation to block the Charleston Loophole.

REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS: Our reproductive rights are under attack, and I refuse to let our country continue to take steps backward. I am committed to restoring the fundamental right to an abortion and making sure that every person has the right to choose. This year, I was happy to cosponsor H.R. 12, the Women's Health Protection Act, which prohibits governmental restrictions on access to abortion services, and H.Res.561, which expressed opposition to the use of State power against people seeking reproductive healthcare.

I am extremely proud of all we've accomplished in year one, but our work is far from finished. As your Representative, I'll continue to bring the voices and priorities of North Carolina's Fourth District to Washington and fight for our district, our country, and our democracy.

Think about January 2024 as the beginning of us breaking the NC Republican supermajority – **County-to-County** is counting on YOU! Happy New Year! Let's start it off by helping one of our brave, wonderful, NC Representatives get re-elected.

All of January is Rep. Diamond Staton-Williams' Month here at C2C! She is a mother of three, a registered nurse, a small business owner, and a volunteer. Diamond received hate mail and death threats after her speech. Her response? "Black women deserve to see themselves making decisions and fighting for what's right, even when it's a losing battle. And I don't regret anything I said."

Let's get Diamond re-elected to NC House District 73 in 2024! Rep. Staton-Williams will join <u>our phone bank kickoff</u> Thursday, Jan. 11, at 5:45 p.m., then we'll start phone banking into her Cabarrus County district to find out what issues are important to her constituents. We hope to make at least 400 calls that night. But we'll keep on calling until Jan. 31! Rise to the challenge and help C2C make 1,500 calls in January.
