DNC and ASDC Announces "Organize Everywhere, Win Anywhere" Strategy – Largest-Ever Monthly DNC Investment into Democratic State and Territory Parties

The DNC will transfer over \$1 million a month into Democratic state parties – a historic increase in monthly funding – to deliver on Chair Martin's commitment to organizing and winning everywhere

Today, DNC Chair Ken Martin and ASDC President Jane Kleeb announced a historic "organize everywhere, win anywhere" strategy – a new four-year agreement to deliver more resources into Democratic state and territory parties than ever before - delivering on Chair Martin's commitment to turbocharging investments in on-the-ground organizing and party building. Under the new State Partnership Program (SPP) agreement, each state party will receive a baseline of \$17,500 a month, a \$5,000 per month increase over the last agreement, and Republican-controlled states will receive an additional investment of \$5,000 a month through the DNC's Red State Fund, putting their total at \$22,500 every month. The combined investments total a monthly transfer of more than \$1 million from the DNC to state parties - the committee's largest investment into Democratic state parties in history. Additionally, the DNC makes significant investments into the technology that powers the Democratic Party, including maintaining the national voter file with robust augmentations and giving state parties best-inclass tools for accessing and leveraging that data. Each state party receives six-figures worth of data and tooling annually.

These resources will allow Democratic state parties to invest in critical infrastructure and staffing, strengthen their data and tech operations, build on-the-ground organizing programs, and better prepare for upcoming election cycles – not just in the months ahead, but in the years to come. Additionally, the new agreement includes the DNC's commitment to hosting six regional training "bootcamps" for state parties per two-year cycle and the hiring of new ASDC staff, including five regional directors.

"With this announcement, we are breaking ground on a historic political investment unlike anything Democrats have done in modern times," said DNC Chair Ken Martin. "Elections are won in states – and that's exactly where we will be investing our resources. When I ran for DNC Chair, I said two things over and over. First, we have to get the DNC out of DC and into the states. Second, we have to organize everywhere and compete everywhere if we're going to win everywhere. This agreement is how we start turning those beliefs into reality. We're putting our money where our mouth is to equip state parties with what they need to reach working families who deserve better, build long-term success all across the ballot, and gain electoral ground for years to come."

"When I ran to be the President of the ASDC, I knew the mission was clear: Democrats needed to rebuild infrastructure in the states and provide our state parties with the resources necessary to win. This historic agreement allows us to do just that: building infrastructure to expand Democratic power across our states and territories, be it in red, blue, or purple America," said ASDC President Jane Kleeb. "State parties are the backbone of the Democratic Party, and through this investment, our state parties will receive the support they need to show voters that, no matter where they live, there is a strong Democratic Party in their corner, protecting their rights and economic opportunity against Republican attacks. I couldn't be more thrilled with this investment and know our state parties across the country are ready to do the work to win elections everywhere."

The SPP funding comes on the heels of Chair Martin's <u>memo</u> laying out his vision for organizing principles centered on organizing early, organizing always, and organizing everywhere.

News from the North Carolina Democratic Party

Update on the 2024 NC Supreme Court race that Jefferson Griffin is still contesting Good News! A federal court has paused the GOP scheme to make voters "cure" ballots they already cast legally. This stay is a win—but the case is still moving forward. In the meantime, we're getting ready for any possibility.

Our digital messages this week are:

Jackson Wins - North Carolina's Attorney General Jeff Jackson is on fire—**4 for 4** in dismantling Trump's lawless chaos. From saving over \$1 billion in NIH research funding for our universities to defending basic constitutional rights, Jackson's lawsuits are hitting Trump's reckless executive orders right where it hurts: in the courtroom and the polls. Meanwhile, GOP reps like Phil Berger, Tim Moore, and Thom Tillis are clapping from the sidelines while Trump's circus runs through North Carolina's economy, public schools, and civil liberties. No pushback. No backbone. Just blind loyalty and bad policy. Jackson's wins aren't just victories in court—they're proof that Democratic leadership gets results. Real protections. Real dollars. Real rights.

Budget Betrayal - The N.C. GOP a.k.a. 'The Budget Bandits' are at it again—raiding North Carolina's schools and communities to bankroll tax cuts for their wealthy buddies. Their \$32.6 billion budget slashes \$57 million from our community colleges, guts UNC programs, and axes support for minority male students and women-owned businesses. Teachers? They get tossed a sad 3.3% raise over two years—barely a blip compared to Gov. Josh Stein's plan to raise starting pay to \$53,000 by 2027. Public programs that actually help people—*like PBS NC*—are getting cut nearly in half. Phil Berger calls this "fiscal responsibility." Economists call it a looming revenue disaster. By 2026, their corporate tax giveaways could crater our budget—and guess who'll be left cleaning up the mess? Let's call this what it is: betrayal with a budget line. NC deserves better—and we're not backing down.

N.C. Farmers - Donald's tariff tantrum is hurting North Carolina's farmers, while Thom Tillis sits back twiddling his thumbs. Donald's tariffs are gutting North Carolina's economy—soybeans, pork, and everything in between. A new <u>Meredith College poll</u> <u>shows nearly half of North Carolinians know these tariffs are hiking up their bills</u>, meanwhile Tillis continues to back Trump's economic dumpster fire. Prices for seeds and equipment are soaring, farms are one bad crop from bankruptcy, and our rural communities—still recovering from Hurricane Helene—are getting sold out for MAGA applause lines. Republicans have turned their backs on the people who feed this state and abroad. Democrats are fighting for fair trade, real relief, and policies that actually help rural North Carolina. In 2026, let's send Tillis packing and elect leaders who'll put NC farmers first—not Trump's fragile ego.

NC Senate Budget Prioritizes Ultra-Wealthy, Leaves Schools and Teachers Behind

The North Carolina Democratic Party issued the following statement in response to the recent NC Senate proposed budget.

"A budget is a value statement that highlights a state's priorities. This budget shows that Senate Republicans want to double down on tax breaks to the **ultra-wealthy and largest corporations while working North Carolinians bear the brunt of rising costs. Instead of making needed investments in North Carolina public schools, this budget chooses to shortchange our teachers and kids.**"

Here's What You Need To Know About the Senate's Budget Proposal:

The Wealthiest People and Largest Corporations Receive Tax Breaks While Working North Carolinians Get Left Behind

- The budget fails to plan for the future, doubling down on corporate tax breaks for wealthy, out-of-state corporate shareholders despite the <u>anticipated</u> budget cliff.
- Senate Republicans aim to increase income tax breaks that overwhelmingly benefit the <u>wealthiest</u> individuals instead of targeting relief for lower and middle income families like the proposals in Governor Stein's budget.
- The budget lacks <u>funding</u> for a fentanyl control unit that would work statewide to address the fentanyl crisis.
- The budget does nothing to help lower housing costs across the state while rents continue to soar and the cost of living continues to increase.
- It includes language that could <u>raise</u> energy costs and boost Duke Energy's profits, making North Carolinians pay for projects that are never completed.

Schools Once Again Fail To Get the Investments They Need

- After adjusting for inflation, teachers and school employees won't <u>actually</u> see any real raise this year. North Carolina's teacher pay <u>currently</u> ranks in the bottom half of the country and this budget doesn't change that.
- Starting teacher stays at the bottom of the Southeast rankings.
- Higher education suffers deep <u>cuts</u> with roughly \$50 million being cut from the Community College System and more than \$33 million in cuts from the UNC system.
- It also lacks the <u>requested</u> funding to get students out of temporary classrooms and trailers providing just 1% of the Governor's ask.

NC Democrats Claim a Victory for Voters as Bipartisan Federal Judges Issue a Stay in Riggs Supreme Court Battle

Tonight, a Federal Appeals Court panel issued a stay requested by Supreme Court Justice Allison Riggs and the North Carolina Democratic Party to prevent voters who legally cast their ballot from having to re-prove themselves or have voices silenced. In response to tonight's win, the Party released this statement:

Voters who followed all the rules and legally cast their ballot in the 2024 election shouldn't be forced to re-prove themselves in order to have their vote counted. Bipartisan federal judges reaffirmed that today by issuing a stay in a bogus and unconstitutional 'cure' process - meaning that it won't move forward until the courts can hear and adjudicate the merits (or lack thereof) of Jefferson Griffin's challenge to voters' rights.

"I am glad that federal judges recognized the harmful precedent this would have set,"

said Chair Anderson Clayton. "I fully expect that, as this case continues to move through federal court, the voters will get a victory and their ballots will be allowed to stand. Democracy depends on it."

Thom Tillis Owns the Pete Hegseth Failure

If Thom Tillis had a backbone, Pete Hegseth never would have been confirmed

As more <u>details</u> <u>continue</u> to spill out on the many ways that Pete Hegseth is failing as Secretary of Defense, the North Carolina Democratic Party issued the following statement.

"The Pentagon wouldn't be in a "full-blown meltdown" if Thom Tillis had a backbone. He knew Hegseth was woefully unqualified to lead the Department of Defense. He knew that he was incompetent. He knew that he was an abuser. He even told Republican Senators that he would oppose Hegseth's nomination. Unfortunately for our country, Thom Tillis once again desperately folded, hoping to cling to political power instead of doing what he knew to be the right thing for our Country. Next year North Carolinians will show Senator Tillis what they think of his cowardice when they replace him with a real leader in November."

Breaking: Governor Stein Maintains Control Over State Board of Elections

In a 2-1 ruling by judges appointed by Republican Supreme Court Justice, Paul Newby, the NC Superior Court ruled today that a recent Republican bill giving power over the State Board of Elections to the NC Auditor, IS unconstitutional.

Senate Bill 382 which passed in December was part of a series of sweeping legislation to curve Democratic power in the Great North State. Their entire agenda is to continue their power grabs against our Governor to appoint members to the Board of Elections and give it to the Republican Auditor, Dave Boliek.

In today's decision, "the court cited previous North Carolina Supreme Court decisions establishing that the governor must have sufficient control over executive boards that carry out primarily administrative functions, including the state and county election boards."

While Governor Stein's power has been maintained by the court of law, we still expect further attacks on the Governor's office and Attorney General by the corrupt NC GOP.

That is why we need your support.

We already overturned the NC GOP's supermajority in the House. Now we must continue the battle against their unconstitutional legislation, by not only winning more seats in 2026, but taking back the majority by 2030.
