URGENT CALL TO ACTION: SPEAK OUT NOW ON REDISTRICTING!

What's Happening: Last week, Republicans in the North Carolina General Assembly unveiled their partisan maps, which were drawn in secret and highlight their continuing power grab.

Why It Matters: These proposed maps will allow GOP politicians to pick their voters through gerrymandering, rather than allowing voters to pick their politicians. The proposed maps will almost certainly **solidify the GOP Supermajority** in the NCGA and **place our House Democratic Leader Robert Reives in a tossup district** by adding in a heavily populated Republican-leaning precinct from Randolph County. **NC Democrats would also likely lose three to four seats in the U.S. House of Representatives, and Chatham County would be split among two Congressional districts.**

What Happens Next (From All On The Line): We expect the redistricting committees to vote on the proposed maps by Tuesday. Then maps will be introduced, debated and voted on the floor of the NC House and NC Senate on Wednesday or Thursday.

Potential Legal Recourse: While Democrats are expected to challenge the new maps in Court, Republicans currently hold a 5-2 advantage in the NC Supreme Court. The outcome in Federal Courts is unclear.

What We (YOU) Need to Do NOW (From All On The Line): The next few days are critical. This is our opportunity to register our outrage and hold politicians in Raleigh accountable. They need to hear from you! Whether you are represented by a Democrat or a Republican, you can:

1. [Call your reps now](#) and tell them what you think of these maps. Tell them how your community is affected by the proposed maps, share what you want to see from the maps, and **tell them to put people over politics and not to vote for maps that divide communities for partisan advantage.**
2. [Email the redistricting committee.](#) If they want to pass gerrymandered maps that dilute the voices of diverse communities, they need to hear what we think of it. If you want to call members as well, you can find all their contact information [here](#).
3. [Upload your comment to the public portal.](#) This is the best way to create a record that shows what the people of North Carolina want from their district maps.
4. [Submit a Letter to the Editor.](#) This tool is blank, so you have to write your own, but it will submit it to 5 local papers with one click.

What NC's Democratic Leaders Had to Say About the New Maps:

Statement from NCDP Chair Anderson Clayton:

“The just-released partisan maps, drawn by Republicans behind closed doors, are a jarring example of the worst kind of politics. Republicans feel like they have the State Courts’ rubber stamp to hand-pick their voters -- instead of giving North Carolinians the power to choose the best representatives for their communities. Diluting our voices to entrench power is a manipulation of our democracy.”

Statement from Governor Roy Cooper:

“Enabled by the State Supreme Court’s partisan reversal of constitutional law, Republican legislators have rolled out their latest illegal maps that show gerrymandering on steroids. Drawn in the back room and armed with their new law that keeps their plotting secret, they have used race and political party to create districts that are historically discriminatory and unfair.”

Statement from Governor Roy Cooper’s Office:

There are two principles that are the absolute bare minimum for a healthy democracy:

1. Voters should all have an equal voice in deciding who represents them.
2. Politicians should not get to choose their voters.

But Republican legislators in North Carolina unveiled their new congressional and state legislature maps last week — and these maps are gerrymandering on steroids.

Here are the facts: North Carolina is a 50/50 state — with all statewide elections coming down to the margins. Our current congressional delegation is evenly divided between Republicans and Democrats.

But under Republicans’ proposed maps, they could win as many as 11 of the 14 congressional districts and continue to hold a majority (and potentially their supermajorities) in both chambers of the state legislature.

It’s outrageous, and we won’t stand for it.

The legislator will vote on these gerrymandered maps this week. We need to make our voices heard loud and clear before then.

An Open Letter Condemning Hamas' Attack on Israel

I want to be clear in my unequivocal condemnation of Hamas' horrific and ongoing attack against innocent Israeli civilians. The indiscriminate murder of Israeli people, the kidnapping and ongoing hostage-taking of Israeli citizens is abhorrent. Beyond the lives

lost and shattered, Hamas' actions have traumatized millions of Jews all over the world, including those in our own community.

I know that many people right here in Durham have family and friends who have been murdered, kidnapped or injured in these attacks.

To my Jewish constituents: I know this has been one of the hardest weeks you have ever experienced. Your lives will forever be changed. I know that you have had to mourn while watching clips of your fellow Americans chant anti-Semitic slurs. I know your social media feeds are unbearable.

I know you have had to have unimaginable conversations with your children. I know that you feel heartbroken and unsafe. I know that these children could have been your children. I know that this event brings up millenniums of persecution and genocide. I am a witness to your pain, and I stand in solidarity with you. I am here to listen, and will do everything in my power to help you be safe here in North Carolina.

To be clear - I stand firmly against Hamas, a group of violent extremists who have sworn to kill all Jews in Israel and beyond.

This was a grotesque act of terror.

My heart aches for Palestinians in my district and abroad whose lives will be forever changed by this week's events. I am deeply saddened by the scale of civilian deaths in Gaza, hundreds have been killed, hundreds of thousands of people are currently displaced, and millions are at risk in the days and weeks to come. Millions are in dire need of food and supplies; Humanitarian assistance should be provided.

As a Black American, I understand what it means to feel this sense of terror and dread in my body, in history, in society. Racism and antisemitism are deeply tied together. Islamophobia is on the rise.

Our unity is the only way through.

I wish our Jewish community a r'fuah shlemah - a complete renewal of body and spirit - as you process this terrifying act of terror.

Redistricting Updates

The majority has released their proposals for new electoral maps for the General Assembly and the United States House of Representatives. We expect floor votes on these maps early next week.

Veto Overrides

The legislative majority voted to override Governor Cooper's vetoes on the following bills:

- House Bill 600 "[Regulatory Reform Act of 2023](#)"
- Senate Bill 512 "[Greater Accountability for Boards/Commissions](#)"
- Senate Bill 678 "[Clean Energy/Other Changes](#)"
- Senate Bill 747 "[Elections Law Changes](#)"
- Senate Bill 749 "[No Partisan Advantage in Elections](#)"

The impacts of Senate Bills 747 and 749, "Elections Law Changes," and "No Partisan Advantage in Elections", respectively, are particularly pressing. Senate Bill 747 will bring

about extreme changes to the way North Carolinians vote and the ease of voting. Governor Cooper expressed that "This legislation has nothing to do with election security and everything to do with Republicans keeping and gaining power," said Governor Cooper. "It requires valid votes to be tossed out unnecessarily, schemes to restrict early voting and absentee ballots, encourages voter intimidation and attempts to give Republican legislators the authority to decide contested election results." Among the bill are provisions that will reject absentee ballots if not received by 7:30PM on election day, even if the delay is due to the Post Office. Additionally, unnecessary signature match and minor reasons to reject absentee ballots are included in the bill. Finally, partisan "observers" are empowered to be present at polling sites, which can lead to intimidation and other issues. This bill sets to completely alter the way we conduct elections and place power in the wrong hands.

Senate Bill 749 changes the structure of election boards at the state and county levels. Under the new law, the legislature will appoint board of elections members across the state. Establishing equal representation of political parties at the boards, the law ensures partisan gridlock. Moreover, when boards cannot reach unanimous agreement, the decision is sent back to the legislature. Therefore, the legislative majority will have the power to change elections and outcomes. Governor Cooper said that "The legislative takeover of state and local elections boards could doom our state's elections to gridlock and severely limit early voting. It also creates a grave risk that Republican legislators or courts would be empowered to change the results of an election if they don't like the winner. That's a serious threat to our democracy, particularly after the nation just saw a presidential candidate try to strongarm state officials into reversing his losing election result. Courts have already ruled the ideas in this bill unconstitutional, and voters overwhelmingly said no when the legislature tried to change the constitution."

I am disappointed that these vetoed bills have been overridden and will now become law. I will continue working to establish better policies and laws that reflect what we need at the present moment.

Golden Leaf Funding for Local Governments

Golden LEAF is accepting applications for the Flood Mitigation Grant Program. Funds may only be awarded to units of **local government**. Local governments from all 100 counties are eligible.

Eligible Projects

Up to \$2,000,000 may be awarded per project.

- Construction of new or improvement of existing publicly owned stormwater infrastructure, including natural drainage infrastructure and flood control equipment.
- Repair of existing stormwater infrastructure damaged or destroyed by flooding, which must include improvements to mitigate against future flooding.

- Engineering expenses related to implementation of flood mitigation solutions. Applications are due Tuesday, December 12 at 12pm.

News from NC Congressman Jeff Jackson

Yesterday afternoon, two draft congressional maps were finally revealed by the majority party in our state legislature. Both of them are, to be frank, absolutely brutal gerrymanders.

If either one becomes final - and we'll know next week - I'm completely toast in Congress, as are two or three of my colleagues.

In both maps, my current district becomes an R+15 seat. That means the last Republican presidential candidate carried the seat by 15 points.

Just to be clear, it is completely impossible to win a seat that leans the other way by 15 points. Not even a remote chance.

I sent you an email two months ago giving you a heads up about this. Unfortunately, it went exactly the way we predicted.

Many of you will ask about the courts. Well, our state Supreme Court flipped in the last election and is now controlled by the same party as our state legislature, so the widespread expectation is there will be no relief there.

As for the federal courts, a few years ago the U.S. Supreme Court basically legalized political gerrymandering. However, certain forms of racial gerrymandering remain illegal. I'm sure there will be litigation on that front, but I don't have a clear sense of timeline or likely outcome.

All that said, let me set it aside for a moment and tell you the most important thing I can:

Serving in this capacity has been ***the greatest honor of my life***. I am so, so grateful to all of you who have followed along. No matter what, I'm going to continue to keep you posted.
