## Governor Stein proposes new budget for North Carolina

The big idea: Gov. Stein proposes a balanced budget that prioritizes investments in our workforce, public education, public safety, public health, and lowering costs for working families.

- Free community college for students entering high-demand fields

## NCDP Chair Statement on Governor Stein's Budget

# Following the release of Governor Stein's budget proposal, North Carolina Democratic Party Chair Anderson Clayton released the following statement:

## Press Release: NCGOP Chair Admits that 65,000 Voters Griffin Is Disenfranchising "Did Nothing Wrong," March 20, 2025

Simmons: "With this particular set of individuals, I'm very sympathetic to them because, again, they did nothing wrong."

Raleigh, N.C. – Even Republicans are saying that the voters Jefferson Griffin is trying to disenfranchise "did nothing wrong." Today, the News & Observer published an interview with North Carolina GOP Chair Jason Simmons in which he admitted that the 65,000 voters' voices Jefferson Griffin is seeking to silence "had every right to register to vote."

This comes on the heels of <u>more than 200 North Carolina</u> jurists, government officials, attorneys, and other legal practitioners from across the political spectrum calling Griffin to stop his baseless efforts to overturn an election.

Read excerpts from the interview below:

## N&O: Interview: NC GOP chair defends challenge of 65,000 votes in Supreme Court election

[...] N&O: There's over 65,000 voters whose ballots are being challenged. What do you say to these voters who say, 'Why should you be able to throw my ballot out if I didn't do anything wrong — if you're just saying the State Board of Elections did something wrong?'

[...] Simmons: We want to make sure that those individuals that are on the voter rolls are allowed to vote, and in many cases, as you've seen, those individuals had every right to public-school register to vote.

[...] N&O: If President Trump had lost North Carolina by a small margin, would you have brought a similar case to challenge the election results?

Simmons: It's tough to get into the hypothetical game. We can only deal with what was in front of us.

[...] N&O: The largest group of challenged voters are those who didn't have a Social Security number or driver's license number in the state's voter registration database. [...] If that's the case, why have you not been able to identify a single ineligible person on that list over the last four months?

Simmons: It goes back to making sure that the data was consistent and complete.

## Press Release, NCDP Chair Issues Statement After Court of Appeals Oral Arguments, March 21, 2025

Following Oral Arguments in the Court of Appeals on Judge Jefferson Griffin's attempt to disenfranchise over 65,000 voters, North Carolina Democratic Party Chair Anderson Clayton released the following statement: "Judge Jefferson Griffin's legal arguments are as weak as his commitment to democracy. You can't change the rules after an election just because you don't like the results. That's basic," **said Chair Anderson Clayton.** "Voters did everything right - they followed the rules that were in place by the State Board of Elections and duly cast their ballot. Throwing out their votes would be antithetical to the founding principle of this country."

#### Over 650 concerned Americans joined Chair Anderson Clayton and North Carolina Democrats to watch together in community the Court of Appeals oral arguments. Here are some of their live reactions:

- "I spent 3 years overseas in the military and voted absentee, not in NC, and actually military DO NOT have to carry their passport with them everywhere they go." *Eleanor Smith, Grandy*
- "This means election results could be voided every time Republicans don't like the results." *Hart (Harry) Edmonds, Hillsborough*
- "Obstruction of an election. How does this affect every other candidate on the 60k plus ballots in question?" *Christine Foote, Pinehurst*
- "I'm a targeted voter who first registered in my county in 2020. So, I question his response that only voters who registered in 2024 were targeted and I'm sure this is true of many others." Connie Nelson
- "I've been registered since 2007, why is my vote being challenged? Griffin is a fraud and should be held accountable...." *Kimberly Peppers*
- "A state board attorney recently said that at least half of the voters that Griffin challenged over driver's license or Social Security numbers actually did provide one. They're just not in the database." *Tom Sullivan, Asheville*
- "This is RIDICULOUS!!! [Justice] Riggs clearly WON this election." Carol Perkins, Apex
- "How can you throw out 60K plus votes for just one race and have them count as well in all the 2024 election?" *Ana Rozzi*
- "My family member voted [by an] overseas ballot. We asked SEVERAL TIMES for [the] portal to submit ID. It is NOT the law...and now they want to throw them out." *Christina Vellucci, Charlotte*
- "The <u>letter this week</u> signed by 200 jurists in the state telling Griffin to drop his challenge was good to see. I would be embarrassed at this point." Hannah Lynch, Roanoke Rapids
- "Of course, this is about more than sore losers. This is about long-term, yearslong planning by not only NC Republicans but also the national GOP to capture our state courts." - *Elaine Maisner, Chapel Hill*
- "I wish someone would point out that the majority of these 60K+ voters still don't know that their votes are in question. Griffin did NOT satisfy the notification requirement." *Gina Taramasso, Cary*
- "I feel like this should be reality TV. I cannot believe this is actually happening."
