Sign up to attend the CCDP County Convention on March 16 at George Moses Horton Middle School, 79 Horton Street, Pittsboro.

This will be our first in-person convention since 2019, so we are really looking forward to seeing everyone there. *Note that there will be no virtual option to attend.*

While the Convention is open to all, only delegates who were previously elected by their precincts and attending the meeting in person can vote on behalf of their precincts.

NC House Minority Leader Robert Reives will be our keynote speaker.

Doors will open at 9 a.m. We will provide coffee and bagels before the convention is called to order at 10 a.m. We ask that elected delegates arrive no later than 9:30 to facilitate an orderly check-in process. To facilitate voting, each precinct will have designated seating for their delegates and each delegate will receive a set of ballots when they check in.

The business of the Convention generally is to elect delegates to the District Conventions for the two Congressional Districts that include our county; to elect certain NCDP committee members; to vote on proposed resolutions adopted by the precincts or through the Resolutions Committee; and to conduct any other business properly brought before the meeting. A link to a detailed agenda and a notice about open NCDP committee positions will be added to this announcement and circulated to registered attendees when it becomes available.

An important item of business at our convention is to elect our county party's representatives to three state district executive committees: one committee for each of the Senate, House and state prosecutors. In the event that the state senator or representative representing Chatham County becomes unable to serve, those committees would play a major role in designating his or her successor. In the case of state prosecutors, the role of that committee is less clear, but we assume that it would be consulted by a Democratic governor in choosing any interim successor. We are soliciting nominations (which may include self nominations) to those committees from all Chatham County Democrats. At our convention we will elect two members of each committee. In addition to the nominations that have already been received, we will take nominations from the floor at the convention.

News from NC Congresswoman Valerie Foushee

February was a busy and productive month. I was grateful to spend time in the Fourth District and Washington, D.C. meeting with local leaders and community members, while also working to avoid a reckless and unnecessary government shutdown. As we enter a new month, I wanted to take a moment to update you on the work I have been doing on behalf of the Fourth District.

Black History Month

February is Black History Month, a time to celebrate the invaluable sacrifices and rich contributions of Black Americans. This month and every month, let us use our voices and our actions to fight against the injustices that continue to plague our society today.

I was delighted to recognize and reflect on the life and legacy of Dr. Rose Butler Browne at Mount Vernon Baptist Church's Black History Month program. I was also honored to join the Orange County Community Remembrance Coalition, Equal Justice Initiative, and the Town of Carrboro for a historical marker unveiling commemorating Manly McCauley, who was a victim of racial hate and violence, and was tragically lynched in 1898. Racial violence and hate still exists today. Historical markers serve as a way to confront the darkest parts of our past, in order to build a more inclusive future.

This month, I also joined my Congressional Black Caucus colleagues in introducing the Protect Black Women and Girls Act, legislation that addresses critical issues impacting Black women and girls. For far too long, Black women and girls have faced disparities throughout our society regarding housing, health care, criminal justice and more – and I'm proud to support this legislation to ensure they have equal opportunities to succeed.

Artificial Intelligence

In February, I hosted a roundtable discussion alongside Congresswoman Deborah Ross (NC-02) centered around Artificial Intelligence with White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP) Director Arati Prabhakar, National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) U.S. Al Safety Institute Director Elizabeth Kelly, and local Al industry leaders at North Carolina Central University.

The Triangle Region is home to top community colleges and universities educating future researchers and innovators. This roundtable was a great opportunity to discuss necessary federal guardrails and public-private partnerships needed to support innovation and growth within the industry while ensuring safe, secure, and trustworthy development of AI technologies.

In Washington, I had the opportunity to ask experts during a House Science, Space, and Technology Committee hearing about how companies in the AI space are promoting DEI and equitable access. As we consider investments into AI education, it is imperative that we include our nation's Historically Black Colleges and Universities, Minority Serving Institutions, and Tribal Colleges and Universities.

With the rapid rise of AI systems, Democratic and Republican Leadership came together to establish the Bipartisan Artificial Intelligence Taskforce, which I am proud to be a part of. Fourth District Focus

I had the privilege of spending time back in the Fourth District connecting with community members and local leaders. I was proud to join a roundtable at North Carolina Central University to highlight the importance of making your voice heard in our elections and protecting our right to vote.

It was a pleasure to join the Town of Carrboro for their legislative breakfast where we had important discussions on local priorities and the needs of Carrboro residents. I look forward to our continued work together to make our local communities stronger.

Last month, I had the opportunity to speak at the 26th Annual Orange County Agricultural Summit, where I discussed local farming priorities for the Fourth District. North Carolina's farmers are the backbone of our state. I will continue to fight for policies that support our farmers and agricultural businesses.

SAVE Student Relief Program

My Congressional Progressive Caucus colleagues and I have made student debt cancellation a priority in Congress. That is why I am excited to share that the President announced a major new initiative.

If you took out less than \$12,000 in loans and have been in repayment for 10 years, ALL of your debt will be canceled. That's right — your loan balance could go down to zero.

To get that relief and other options for major monthly reductions to your loan payments, you need to be enrolled in the <u>Saving on A Valuable Education (SAVE)</u>

<u>Plan</u>. This is the same plan that ensures no borrower who makes less than \$15 an hour will have to make any student loan payments. It will also make sure that interest does not pile up and increase your debt amount, and that your spouse's income cannot be used to drive up your payment amount.

News from NC Congressman Jeff Jackson

As you may have seen, last night was the State of the Union.

My wife, Marisa, sat in the balcony. I was on the House floor with the entire House, the Senate, the Supreme Court, the Cabinet, and the Joint Chiefs.

This was my second SOTU, and honestly one of the best parts is milling around before it starts.

The Senators came in pretty early, so it gave us a chance to say hello. I really don't see Senators too often. They work on the other side of the Capitol and we don't normally cross paths. So, over the last few weeks I had been making a mental note of the Senators I wanted to speak briefly with, knowing this would be a decent chance to do it.

By the time the Cabinet and the Supreme Court walks in, the ceremony is really underway and there's not really a chance to say hello. I'm not sure I would try to have a word with a member of our Supreme Court even if I could - would feel inappropriate to me - but in any event there's not really a moment for that.

And by the way, all of this takes place under the brightest possible lights. Literally. For nationally televised ceremonies, they turn on the spotlights that hang in each corner of the ceiling. What you're seeing on TV is about 3x brighter than it normally is on the House floor. There's a lot of squinting and shielding your eyes when you first step onto the House floor as your eyes adjust.

A few observations from inside the room during the speech:

- There was less heckling than I expected. A group of us made a bet before the speech and we figured there would be four or five clear heckles from members of Congress. I only counted two.
- When support for Ukraine was mentioned, about 75% of the members stood and clapped. I think that's roughly indicative of the level of support from Congress.
- There weren't too many topics that brought everyone to their feet. Two
 exceptions were the mention that Sweden joined NATO this week and the
 recognition of the Swedish Prime Minister in the balcony. Another was the
 mention of the late Rep. John Lewis, with whom most members here served for
 their entire time in Congress.

 When the President mentioned support for IVF, I looked up at Marisa. She had IVF twice, and now we have Owen (age 8) and Avery (age 5). She was standing and clapping about as hard as you can imagine. I thought it was beautiful and I was really glad she was there for that moment.

Since I'm leaving Congress at the end of the year, this will be my last State of the Union. I tried to glance around and commit as much of it to my long-term memory as possible. Being able to be part of such a singular moment for our democracy - all three branches, under one roof, while the President stands and addresses them - is an honor so great as to be a little disorienting. It's part of my past now, but it's a part I will remember well.

Policy Update for March 4, 2024

Voting Rights

A panel of three Superior Court Judges heard arguments Wednesday about the constitutionality of a new law that transfers election board appointment power from the governor to the state legislature. The law would change the format of the state elections board from five seats appointed by the governor, three of which are allotted to members of the governor's party, to eight seats with four each appointed by opposing party leaders in the NCGA. The same three-judge panel previously issued a preliminary injunction preventing the law from going into effect, and this week they considered Cooper's attorney's arguments in favor of a summary (without trial) judgment alongside arguments from attorneys for Republican legislative leadership that the law is constitutional. The presiding judge on the panel, Superior Court Judge Edwin Wilson, said that the court would likely issue a decision by the end of next week.
