Get Ready to VOTE in the Primary Election!

The 2024 Democratic Primary Election is upon us! Mail-in ballots are available now. Early voting began February 15, and Primary Election Day is March 5.

Want to vote by mail? Request an absentee ballot by 5 p.m. Tuesday, February 27, at https://votebymail.ncsbe.gov. The Chatham County Board of Elections began mailing out absentee ballots on January 19.

The Early Voting Period runs from February 15 to March 2. Early Voting Polling places are listed on page 4 of this digest. During Early Voting, polls are open Monday – Friday, 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.; Saturday 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.; and Sunday February 25 (only) from Noon to 3 p.m.

On Election Day, March 5, polls are open from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. On Election Day, you should vote in your precinct. To find out where you can vote on Election Day, visit: https://vt.ncsbe.gov/reglkup/, visit

Call for Poll Observers

It is that time of year again! Early voting for the 2024 NC Primary begins on February 15th and runs through March 2nd. We are recruiting volunteers to serve as POLL OBSERVERS.

This year more than ever CCDP Poll Observers watch for any missteps in the election processes inside each polling place. They've been in use for at least a hundred years as a way to promote election integrity, with the idea that if both parties are watching, it's much harder for either to tamper with the votes. If someone goes amiss, poll observers contact a central incident reporting operation.

You must be a resident of Chatham County to be a poll observer in Chatham County.

Poll Observers typically sign up for a 4-hour shift at a specific polling location. In addition to these shifts, we would like to have a list of at-large Poll Observers and a small team of Hot Line volunteers. In general, at-large observers are allowed to observe at any polling site in the county for any length of time. Hot Line volunteers can work from anywhere and enter issues reported by observers into a central easy-to-use system.

The hope is that we can start to build these teams during the primaries and have this early experience carry over into this year's all important general election in the fall. ICYMI: Mark Robinson Calls for Transgender Women To Be "Arrested" Over Bathroom Use, Suggests Reviving HB2

Reports are highlighting Lt. Gov. Mark Robinson's recent comments at a campaign rally arguing that "people who previously identified as male should be 'arrested' if they go in a women's bathroom" and "suggests they should 'find a corner outside somewhere' to relieve themselves." According to a video obtained by Vice News, Robinson even suggested reviving legislation similar to HB2, a law "that led to national headlines and economic boycotts," saying: "We're not going to talk about it here in North Carolina. We already passed the law. If we need to pass another one, we will."

"Mark Robinson's pattern of using his platform to demean and attack North Carolinians is dangerous for our state," **said NCDP Spokesperson Tommy Mattocks.** "We've seen this type of divisive and hateful vision plummet our state's economy and reputation – and voters rejected it. Mark Robinson is using that same losing playbook and in 2024, voters are ready to remind him that hate does not belong in our state."

The comments drew ire from Robinson's GOP primary opponents, slamming him for "trying to rise to power through hate" and "wreck[ing] GOP chances for regaining the White House and the governorship here in North Carolina."

Washington Post: Trans women should be arrested over bathroom use, N.C. gubernatorial candidate says

- Robinson's comments on the campaign trail this month are the most recent in a
 controversial record that stretches back years. He called the Holocaust
 "hogwash" in a past Facebook post that he later said was "poorly worded," WRAL
 reported. In June 2021, Robinson called the LGBTQ community "filth."
- Robinson entered the political arena in the aftermath of the demise of House Bill 2, the so-called bathroom bill. After a year of fierce blowback that included economic boycotts, job losses and public criticism, lawmakers repealed the law in a deal that prohibited local governments from passing measures to protect LGBTQ people.
- "His comments about the Holocaust being hogwash along with his demeaning comments about women will wreck GOP chances for regaining the White House and the governorship here in North Carolina," said Alex Baltzegar, a spokesman for Bill Graham, one of the candidates competing against Robinson for the GOP nomination, told The Post.
- "Mark Robinson is history's latest example of someone trying to rise to power through hate," [Folwell] said.

New Report: Under Unaccountable GOP Voucher Program, North Carolina Taxpayers Paid Almost \$483,000 to Private School that Appears to Not Exist

- WFAE published an <u>article</u> highlighting how under the disastrous Republican voucher program, North Carolina taxpayers have sent almost \$483,000 to a private school that is impossible to locate and might not exist at all in the Charlotte area.
- Six months after investigating the Teaching Students Achieving Academy that
 receives scholarship money under the voucher program and failing to locate the
 physical school, a WFAE reporter attempted again to find the institution and learn
 more about the education being offered at the school. Two registered addresses
 with the school were visited with no success and several phone calls to school
 officials were shut down or ended without answers.
- While the General Assembly continues to chronically underfund North Carolina's public schools, Teaching Achieving Students Academy has received \$42,000 in money under the voucher program during the current school year, bringing the total over the last 10 years to almost \$483,000.
- The General Assembly's most recent budget will expand this disastrous voucher program by \$250 million over the next two years to a total of \$4 billion over the next ten years. Some school districts will lose up to 8% of their revenue to private schools and several rural schools may be forced to combine with other schools or to close due to lack of funding.

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News from NC Congressman Jeff Jackson

At the start of the week, we were taken by surprise when every member of Congress got an email telling us there was a new "foreign military capability."

We were all invited to schedule a time to go into a secure room and get a briefing, which I did.

I can't tell you anything about what I saw in that room. I also can't confirm any reporting based on anonymous sources discussing what we were shown in that room, because that would be an indirect way of telling you what I saw.

My sense is that I will be allowed to go into more detail with you in the coming weeks. As soon as I am allowed to do that, I certainly will. This is just a moment when I'm not allowed to be as transparent as I'd like, and I wanted to tell you that directly.

Internal Warfare

My hope was that this would be the week we finally saw some progress on the budget. We've punted three times so far, each time just before the clock ran out and we went into shutdown.

The clock is set to run out again in two weeks. We have a staggering amount of budget work to do between now and then if we want to avoid another punt... and yet, things aren't moving.

As far as I can tell, we didn't make any progress last week, or this week.

In fact, we were sent home a day early this week because of an internal fight within the majority party about whether to bring certain bills to a vote.

It's easy to say, "This is Congress being dysfunctional." And broadly speaking, that's true.

But we can be a little more specific. What's actually happening is there are about 30 folks in the House who have a veto on almost everything, and they are choosing to use it on *almost everything*.

"Well Jeff, that's because they are fighting for more conservative policies."

Well, not exactly. Having watched these folks up close for over a year, they're up to something else.

The way you can tell this isn't about policy is that these 30 folks don't have a strategy to actually achieve their goals. Their big push - which has been to shut down the government - would almost certainly backfire and make it *less* likely that they'd get the budget concessions they want, simply because of how massively unpopular a shutdown would be.

They absolutely know this. They are smart enough at politics to understand that the course they are recommending would most likely drag their agenda backwards.

But they believe that if they use a lot of tough-sounded language, their supporters won't notice.

So, if you were a brand-new member of Congress and I were one of these 30 people and I decided to pitch you on joining our effort - and I was willing to be super candid with you - it would sound like this:

"Ok, so here's what we do. We use our numbers to block a ton of legislation. We don't have enough numbers to actually pass our own. And here's the important part: When they try to compromise with us and give us some of what we want, we say no. At that point, they have to try to go around us. That means we're not going to get anything that we want. But it also means we get a huge amount of media attention, and we can tell our supporters that we're the strong ones and everyone else is caving. So basically, what we do is trade policy wins for political wins, but we use a ton of super-heated rhetoric to cover that up. You'll get less done with us, but you'll get 10x more attention. So whaddya say?"

And... it's basically working for them. No policy wins, but the vast majority of the attention. Crazy political strategy, but in their own way, highly successful.

- NC Board of Elections endorses adjustments to voter ID rules for use after the primary – Lynn Bonner, NC Newsline
