News from the North Carolina Democratic Party

NCDP, the NC Coordinated Campaign, and Biden for President are hiring for all sorts of positions right here in North Carolina. If you're interested in working in this movement, stop by ncdp.org/jobs.

Our digital messages this week are:

GOP in disarray: Y'all, it has never been more obvious how outgunned and outclassed the GOP is than right now. The Biden campaign is breaking fundraising records while the Trump campaign struggles to meet half of Biden's cash on hand. Ten new Biden-Harris field offices are opening in North Carolina to the Trump campaign's zero. The Biden team and the DNC are staffing up entire departments in battleground states like ours, while Trump and the RNC can barely get state directors on the ground. Also, ICYMI: while the NCGOP's slate is waffling over whether or not they should outwardly support their most extreme members, our statewide slate is standing strong together.

Clean energy future: According to the new book "Clean Economy Now" by Bob Keefe, North Carolina has attracted more <u>clean energy investments</u> under the Inflation Reduction Act than any other state in the nation.

Teacher turnover: Pay stagnation, lack of support, and growing fear of GOP culture wars are pushing teachers away from their profession. Last year, the <u>teacher turnover rate skyrocketed by 47%</u>, resulting in one in every nine teachers quitting or choosing to retire. Republicans must be held responsible for the damage they're doing to our public schools at the ballot box this November.

Black Maternal Health Week: Thursday, April 11 marks the beginning of Black Maternal Health Week to bring awareness, advocacy, and action to change the state of Black Maternal Health Care. Black women are dying due to pregnancy-related complications at a national rate of three to four times that of white women. We ask that you share the graphic and call your representatives at every level and urge them to take action on one of the greatest public health crises of our time.

President Biden announces new plans to cancel student debt for tens of millions of Americans NEW

- President Biden is announcing new plans to cancel student debt for tens of millions of Americans.
- President Biden and Vice President Harris have already provided student loan debt relief for 4 million borrowers — now, they are planning to provide debt relief that would bring the total to over 30 million.
- President Biden has long believed that college should be a ticket to the middle class, not a burden that weighs on families. That's why, starting on Day One, he has taken unprecedented steps to fix the broken student loan system, make college more affordable, and bring the promise of higher education within reach for more Americans through targeted student debt relief.
- This relief not only would create more financial stability for millions of working and middle-class families, it would address the disproportionate debt burden on communities of color.
 - Black students are more likely to take on student loans than their white peers and end up holding nearly twice as much debt as their white peers four years after graduation.
 - Black and Latino borrowers are more likely to default on their student loans compared to white borrowers.
- Meanwhile, Donald Trump's long history of opposing relief makes it clear he would not only hang borrowers who have yet to receive relief out to dry, but also make the student debt crisis worse:
 - Trump <u>praised</u> his Supreme Court nominees for blocking President Biden's original plan to relieve student debt for low and middle-income borrowers.
 - Trump <u>tried to eliminate</u> the Public Service Loan Forgiveness program, which provides relief to teachers, nurses, first responders, military officials, and others who work in public service.
 - Trump <u>proposed</u> freezing Pell Grants, which President Biden has increased to <u>record</u> levels — affecting the over <u>60% of Black and 50%</u> <u>Latino undergraduates</u> who rely on them.
 - The Trump administration <u>made it harder</u> for students who were lied to and misled by predatory for-profit colleges to get their loans discharged. President Biden made it a top priority to forgive debt for these students, leading to forgiveness for more than <u>1.3 million borrowers</u>.
 - Trump's allies in Congress have <u>released a proposal</u> to end the President's SAVE Plan — the most affordable student loan repayment plan in history.

 Trump's close allies and advisors have detailed plans to outright end President Biden's student debt relief that is erasing debt and providing a ladder to the middle class.

Trump says "I was proudly the person responsible" for overturning Roe NEW

- Today, he bragged about it, saying "I was proudly the person responsible" for ending Roe.
- He says women should be punished for getting reproductive health care.
- If MAGA Republicans in Congress put a national abortion ban on the resolute desk, there is no question Trump would sign it into law – and his allies already have plans to rip away access through executive action.
- Trump's comments today are an endorsement of the nightmare we're seeing play out in the more than 20 states with abortion bans in effect, the majority of which have no exceptions for rape or incest.
- Because of Trump, 1 in 3 women of reproductive age now live under extreme and dangerous bans:
 - Women's lives put at risk as they're turned away from emergency rooms, forced to go to court to seek permission for the medical attention they need, and left to travel hundreds of miles for health care.
 - Doctors threatened with prosecution for doing their jobs.
 - Access to fertility treatments at risk for families who are desperately trying to get pregnant.
- It is outrageous and unacceptable that this is happening in America but Trump wants to make it a reality in all 50 states, with or without the help of Congress.
- President Biden and Vice President Harris stand with the vast majority of Americans who support a woman's right to choose and if given a Democratic Congress, they will restore the protections of Roe in federal law once and for all.

> Statement from President Biden

"Donald Trump made it clear once again today that he is – more than anyone in America – the person responsible for ending Roe v. Wade. He is – more than anyone in America – responsible for creating the cruelty and the chaos that has enveloped America since the Dobbs decision.

"Trump once said women must be punished for seeking reproductive health care - and he's gotten his wish. Women are being turned away from emergency rooms, forced to go to court to seek permission for the medical attention they need, and left to travel hundreds of miles for health care. In states like Florida,

abortion will likely soon be illegal before many women know they're pregnant. Because of Donald Trump, one in three women in America already live under extreme and dangerous bans that put their lives at risk and threaten doctors with prosecution for doing their jobs. And that is only going to get worse. With all his empty words on fertility treatments, Trump doesn't tell you the MAGA Republicans he controls in Congress have put forward bills that could ban fertility treatments and that the Speaker of the House he empowered is one of the strongest supporters for a national abortion ban in the nation. Let there be no illusion. If Donald Trump is elected and the MAGA Republicans in Congress put a national abortion ban on the Resolute Desk, Trump will sign it into law.

"Here's what Donald Trump doesn't understand: When he ripped away Roe v. Wade, he ripped away a fundamental right for the women of America that the United States Supreme Court had affirmed and reaffirmed for 50 years. As a fundamental right, it didn't matter where you lived. It was granted to you as an American, not as a resident of any state. Generations of women had come to rely on that right. Now we're in the extraordinary position where women today have fewer rights than their mothers and grandmothers. That has never happened before in America. And it cannot be allowed to stand. I am determined to restore the federal protections of Roe v. Wade. So, it won't matter where you live in America: The fundamental right to choose for women will once again be the law of the land. If you give me and Vice President Harris a Democratic Congress, that is exactly what we will do.

"Trump is simply lying. There was no groundswell of support in America for overturning Roe. In fact, support for Roe is higher today in America than it has ever been. The real truth is Trump made a political deal in 2016. He promised to appoint a Court that would get rid of Roe. And he had to make good on that debt. So, he did. It was never about public policy or what was right or what Trump believed. It was always about politics.

"Trump admits as much in his statement today. Having created the chaos of overturning Roe, he's trying to say, 'Oh, never mind. Don't punish me for that. I just want to win.'

Speaker Tim Moore wants Michele Morrow to be in Charge of Your Child's Education

Speaker Tim Moore publicly supported Michele Morrow's candidacy for North Carolina Superintendent for Public Instruction, saying "I'm a good loyal fellow Republican. I'm gonna vote for the Republican nominee for office."

"Speaker Moore has just let North Carolinians know that he supports Michele Morrow, who has advocated more for public executions of public officials than she has for public education," **said NCDP Chair Anderson Clayton.** "Michele Morrow has called our public schools 'socialist indoctrination centers', took her own children to the insurrection on January 6th, homeschools her kids and said she'd like to see a constitutional amendment to get rid of the state board of Education. Now, Speaker Moore wants her

to be in charge of our public schools and its \$11 billion budget. Every Republican will now have to answer for Speaker Moore attempting to normalize an extremist who is nationally known for her violent rhetoric and conspiracy theories. Democrats are fighting for the future of public education in our state, and we are proud that we are offering a clear choice in this race with Mo Green."

News from NC Congresswoman Valerie Foushee

I wanted to take a moment to update you on the work that I've been doing in the Fourth District and Washington, D.C. to serve you.

In March, the House voted to pass the <u>Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2024</u> and the <u>Further Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2024</u>, legislation that will ensure the federal government remains funded through the end of the fiscal year. I was proud to vote for the passage of both bills, which included all fifteen Community Project Funding requests which I have championed, that will deliver federal funding directly to local projects throughout the Fourth District.

In total, I secured **over \$12.39 million** in federal funding for fifteen Community Project Funding requests from Fourth District non-profits and public institutions. You can find information regarding the projects included in the first government funding package here, and the second government funding package here.

Congressional Trip to Israel

I recently returned from a congressional trip to Israel where my colleagues and I met with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, Israeli President Isaac Herzog, Members of the Knesset, Palestinian leaders in Ramallah, U.S. Ambassador Jack Lew, and family members of hostages to discuss the ongoing conflict in the region.

Fostering diplomatic dialogue and facilitating de-escalation efforts is the only way to reach a bilateral ceasefire, ensure the release of all remaining hostages, alleviate the humanitarian crisis in Gaza, and achieve the ultimate goal of a permanent two-state solution. To ensure long-term stability and security in the region, we must use diplomacy as a tool to bring both sides to the table for meaningful negotiations towards a comprehensive and lasting peace agreement. Following my trip to Israel, I joined 13 House Democrats in sending a letter to President Biden reinforcing our earlier calls for a bilateral ceasefire and to urge the administration to ensure that U.S. foreign aid will not be used to deepen the worsening humanitarian crisis in Gaza. Highlights from Washington

On March 7, President Biden delivered his State of the Union Address to Congress, where he highlighted how his administration has lowered health care costs, cancelled student debt to grow the middle class, defended reproductive freedoms, delivered historic benefits for America's veterans, and fought to prevent gun violence in our community.

I was proud to be joined by local gun violence prevention activist, Lavern Lucier, as my guest to the State of the Union Address. Lavern Lucier is the mother of the late-Syncere Burrell, who was the victim of a shooting in Durham in 2020. Lucier has long been a critical ally in the fight to slow the flow of guns into local communities. I applaud her commitment to making our schools, neighborhoods, and streets a safer place for our children.

As a member of the New Democrat Coalition's AI Working Group, I joined my colleagues in meeting with key stakeholders to discuss responsible development and deployment of AI systems. From housing to lending to hiring, ensuring safety and fairness is paramount as these systems effect a vast variety of consumers.

Last month, I had the honor of joining a roundtable discussion hosted by the U.S. House Pro-Choice Caucus, Men 4 Choice, and the Commission on the Social Status of Black Men and Boys for a powerful conversation on the role of Black men in protecting our reproductive freedoms.

Reproductive rights are under attack across the nation. Discussions like these are an important step in working together in our fight for reproductive justice.

As a member of the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure's Highways and Transit Subcommittee, I had the opportunity to ask experts how investing in transit eases access for individuals commuting long distances each day.

Lack of affordable housing continues to push individuals further and further from their places of work, and it is more important than ever that public transportation systems reach rural areas across the nation.

Last month, I introduced the IMPACT Act, which passed through the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology's markup with unanimous support. This bipartisan bill will take significant strides in reducing harmful emissions during the manufacturing processes of cement, concrete, and asphalt, key building materials that are essential for our nation's infrastructure. This forward-thinking bill will enhance the competitiveness of American manufacturing and R&D. I am proud to see it progress one step further towards becoming a law. I also recently introduced the <u>EMPOWER Act</u> alongside U.S. Representative Ted Lieu (CA-36), which would increase the government's match for small campaign donations in the public financing system. Since the Citizens United Supreme Court Case, wealthy corporations have had an extensive influence in our elections. It's long past time for Congress to reform the campaign finances system and put the power back in the hands of voters. You can read more about the EMPOWER Act here.

Fourth District Focus

In North Carolina, I was proud to welcome Vice President Kamala Harris and Governor Roy Cooper to Durham last month to highlight the \$32 million awarded to women and minority-led venture capital funds to bolster our local businesses.

Last month, I had the opportunity to join Food Tank and Duke University for an important discussion on how Congress can play a bigger role in ensuring food accessibility. Food insecurity continues to affect over 44 million Americans. Congress must do everything it can to help put food on the table for American families in need.

I was proud to join NC Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Kody Kinsley at a town hall on minority healthcare access hosted by the Chapel Hill-Carrboro NAACP and the Northern Orange NAACP. Minority communities face additional barriers to vital healthcare resources, and I will continue to fight in Congress for equitable healthcare access across our communities.

I had the pleasure of meeting with the East Chapel Hill Rotary Club to share an update on the work I've been doing in Congress, and to discuss our community's needs. Thank you to the East Chapel Hill Rotary Club for hosting this engaging discussion on local priorities, and for your continued service to our community!

Constituent Services

I'm proud to report that in March, my office closed **over 70** constituent cases and helped recover **\$106,210** owed to constituents in the Fourth District from federal agencies!

Navigating federal agencies can be difficult, but my office is here to help if you are having trouble with passports, Social Security and Medicare benefits, immigration, military and veteran benefits, IRS and tax issues, and much more. If you ever need

News from NC Congressman Jeff Jackson

I'm on the Armed Services Committee and this week we met with the four-star General in charge of U.S. forces in Europe.

Most of our conversation was about Ukraine. Here are the highlights from the unclassified portion.

He began by emphasizing that our allies in Europe are doing a lot to help, specifically mentioning that the vast majority of tanks and military fuel for Ukraine has come from European allies.

However, he told us there are two specific areas where America's contributions are critical: artillery shells and air defense interceptors.

Ukraine has begun strictly rationing their use of artillery. Russia is now firing roughly 10,000 rounds of artillery *per day*, which is 5x more than Ukraine. According to the

General, Russia will be firing 10x more than Ukraine within a few weeks unless there is further aid.

That would be a potential game-changer that could break the stalemate and allow Russia to punch through Ukrainian defenses, but there's an even bigger risk: running out of interceptors.

Our heavy supply of interceptors to Ukraine has prevented Russia from obtaining air superiority. In short, Russian fighter jets can't get close to Ukraine or they'll be shot down. That has kept the war on the ground, which has allowed Ukraine to take advantage of defensive fortifications and shorter supply lines. Once those interceptors are gone, it brings the Russian air force into the war in a way it simply hasn't been until now, and the combined effect with a 10x artillery advantage could be decisive.

Those interceptors are also used to take down incoming Russian missiles, but Ukraine has so few interceptors left that it now has to allow many of those missile attacks to hit their targets. Russia knows this and has stepped up their attacks on the electric grid, landing some major hits last week.

Every few days, Russia launches a major attack. It appears that their attack rhythm matches their artillery shell production rhythm - as soon as they have enough shells for an attack, they let loose, then wait until they've made enough shells to attack again. But they are also clearly preparing for a major summer offensive.

There were some skeptical questions from some committee members about spending more money to help Ukraine defend itself. The General made the point that the vast majority of the funds allotted for Ukraine are being spent in the United States. The American inventory purchased by Ukraine is typically then replaced with newly-manufactured inventory. In that way, we have used our support of Ukraine to modernize some aspects of our own military.

There were also some skeptical questions about the accountability for the weapons we're selling to Ukraine, so the General walked us through the supply chain: Ukraine makes a selection of military hardware and we approve their purchase. Then we ship the hardware to Poland, where it is received and accounted for by American soldiers who are stationed there. At that point, it is transferred to Ukrainians. Most of the hardware has barcodes and the Ukrainians have scanners that allow us to maintain some oversight into where those weapons are. The General admitted that we don't have perfect oversight once the weapons get to the frontlines, but given that we're talking about an active war zone, that's to be expected.

Finally, there was a discussion about what "winning" looks like. That was a little tough. For the General's part, he was pretty clear that he doesn't see the total eviction of Russia from all Ukrainian territory as realistic at this point. He described a successful involvement by the U.S. and our allies as making sure that Ukraine remained "sovereign and independent" - which is another way of saying, "not conquered by Russia."

Last week, I gave you a sense of the politics of this issue. In short, the Speaker supports further Ukrainian aid but is trying to find a way to call it for a vote without enraging his right-flank to the point of being fired. The big question is whether he'll call a vote on the Ukraine bill that already passed the Senate or try to cobble together his own version to appease his right-flank. We've essentially been waiting on that decision from him for the last several months.

"Well Jeff, are we going to see it next week?"

Not sure. Right now, here's what we're scheduled to vote on next week (and this is true):

- H.R. 6192 Hands Off Our Home Appliances Act
- H.R. 7673 Liberty in Laundry Act
- H.R. 7645 Clothes Dryers Reliability Act
- H.R. 7637 Refrigerator Freedom Act
- H.R. 7626 Affordable Air Conditioning Act
- H.R. 7700 Stop Unaffordable Dishwasher Standards Act

You might look at that list and see a handful of message bills designed to inflame a narrative about the over-regulation of kitchen appliances. I see it differently. I see those bills as the Speaker trying to give his right-flank *everything he can think of* before calling a vote on Ukraine. He's basically giving them a nickel's worth of goodwill before asking them for a dollar, but I guess he figures it's worth a shot. And if it gets us a vote on Ukraine, then sure, go for it.

A.I. Jeff - part two

Naturally, the short anecdote I threw into my last email - almost as an after-thought - was the part everyone responded to, to the point where reporters called and wanted to talk about it.

For those who missed that <u>one</u>, I included a story about how I have to make a lot of phone calls as a candidate and - more and more - people don't believe I'm a real person. They think I'm A.I.

This culminated in a woman who recently refused to believe it was me, despite my assurance that I was a real person.

Many of you replied, reasonably, to the effect of, "Hey Jeff, that's a problem we're all worried about, and since you're in Congress you should do something about it."

Fair enough. Here's the latest on that front.

Since ChatGPT hit the scene early last year, several dozen bills have been filed to address various aspects of A.I.

Some take a broad view and try to regulate A.I. in general ways and some try to tackle very specific concerns like the threat of A.I. to musicians, or banning A.I. from being able to fire people (the "No Robot Bosses Act"), or even empowering A.I. to prescribe drugs.

And then there's a whole separate category of bills trying to protect us from the threat of deepfakes and A.I. forgeries.

By my count, at least eight of those bills have been filed just in the last six months. Some of them are specific to elections and some are specific to robocalls and telemarketers.

A few thoughts on all these A.I. bills:

- 1. The bills have gotten smarter over the last year. The ones being offered now are more sophisticated than the bills we saw in the initial reaction to ChatGPT. Legislators are climbing a learning curve.
- 2. This issue is still largely bipartisan. I'm looking at who is filing these bills and how they're written and there don't seem to be many big partisan divisions here yet.
- 3. My sense is that none of these bills will pass anytime soon but then again, they weren't really meant to. There's a bipartisan working group that says it's going to debut a bunch of recommendations in about a month and most of these current bills exist to be ideas for leadership to consider when crafting the actual A.I. package that we hope is coming.

Right now, my biggest hope is we can at least pass something to protect the upcoming election from deepfakes. It's not unrealistic to think that - in a country full of 1% races - an election could be decided based on an A.I. forgery this year.

Consumer Alert

Tax Day, and Tax Scammers, are Approaching

Reminder: Tax Day is Monday, April 15. With the deadline to file your taxes approaching, scammers will try to trick you out of your hard-earned money. Use our tips below to help protect yourself and your loved ones from tax season scammers.

- Guard your personal information. Identity thieves can use your Social Security number to take out loans, open credit cards, or even collect your tax refund.
 Email is vulnerable to hackers, so avoid emailing your Social Security number or other confidential information to a tax preparer or accountant. If you're using a website to file your taxes, make sure you confirm it is a secure site before entering any personal information.
- Be wary of anyone who calls or emails you and offers to help with your taxes, demands tax payments, or claims to be with the IRS. The IRS will not call you directly or have law enforcement or another government agency call you on their behalf. If you get a call from someone claiming to work for a government agency, ask them for their name, identification number, and contact number. Then, hang up and look up and call a known contact number for that government agency to verify the call. Avoid anyone who demands you make immediate payments using methods like gift cards, money orders, cryptocurrency, or wire transfers.
- Think twice before you opt for an instant refund. Some tax preparers and banks offer a refund anticipation check (RAC). This is a paid service for taxpayers who don't have a bank account to use for direct deposit of their refund, or who don't have the money to pay for tax preparation assistance. There's a fee (typically about \$30) to set up the RAC system. The preparer deducts that fee, their tax preparation charges, and other fees from the eventual refund. After all that, there may not be much of your actual refund left.
- If you have questions about something a tax preparer tells you about your taxes, check it out. You can contact the IRS at 1-800-829-1040 or the NC Department of Revenue at 1-877-252-4052.

Filing your taxes can be stressful, and it is easy to let the situation get the best of you. If you are unsure about something or something doesn't feel right, always make sure to do your research first. If you believe you have been the victim of a tax scam, contact our office at 1-877-5-NOSCAM or file a complaint online at www.ncdoj.gov/complaint.

News from Democracy North Carolina

The word "unprecedented" has become nearly meaningless in recent years, but for many alive today, there is no other way to describe the times we are in. The refusal to address either in this moment stops our ongoing struggle for liberation in its tracks. As Fannie Lou Hamer said more than 50 years ago, nobody's free until everybody's free.

It is not too late to choose a different path. To choose hope, accountability, positive action.

We acknowledge the catalyst and loss of life in this ongoing struggle which occurred in October and mourn those losses, as well as wish for the immediate return of those in captivity. And we can't deny the horrific response which continues in front of us now. We rise with others who have said it before and those we hope will join us in the call to take action to end the occupation and our nation's complicity in the oppression taking place in Gaza.

Permanent ceasefire now.
