Attorney General Josh Stein: We've Ended the Rape Kit Backlog in North Carolina

- Attorney General Stein announced that North Carolina has ended the backlog of untested sexual assault kits a milestone more than six years in the making that is already delivering justice to victims and survivors.
- When AG Stein entered office in 2017, there were more than 16,000 untested sexual assault kits sitting on the shelves of local law enforcement.
- Through his bipartisan work with the legislature, local law enforcement, State Crime Lab scientists, advocates, and survivors, AG Stein led the effort to track, test, and review 11,858 testable kits that has led to 114 arrests.
- AG Stein has also put in place measures to ensure that a backlog in North Carolina never happens again and will continue to partner with law enforcement to solve cold cases, get rapists off the streets and behind bars, and deliver justice to victims.
- This accomplishment is yet another example of Josh's record of working with Democrats and Republicans to make communities safer. As North Carolina's chief law enforcement officer since 2017, Josh has not only partnered with the legislature to eliminate the nation's largest backlog of untested rape kits, but has also fought to strengthen our laws to protect kids from sex crimes, prosecute drug traffickers, and tackle the fentanyl crisis.

Biden's Latest Plan for Student Loan Cancellation Moves Forward as a Proposed Regulation

- In North Carolina, the Biden-Harris Administration has approved \$1.8 billion in relief for 24,560 borrowers under Public Service Loan Forgiveness and \$54 billion in relief for 1,400,000 million borrowers due to the Administration's fixes to income-driven repayment plans.
- The broadest forgiveness category would help borrowers who owe more than they originally borrowed because of runaway interest. It would eliminate up to \$20,000 in interest for anyone in that situation, while those with annual incomes below \$120,000 and enrolled in income-driven repayment plans would get all their interest erased with no maximum limit. It would be done automatically.
- It would automatically cancel loans for those who went to colleges or programs considered to have low financial value.
- Borrowers would be eligible for cancellation if they attended a program that leaves graduates with earnings no better than those with a high school diploma, for example, or programs that leave graduates with large shares of debt compared with their incomes.

- Another category would cancel loans for people who have been paying back their undergraduate student loans for at least 20 years, and those who have been paying graduate loans for at least 25 years.
- The department said the hardship proposal will offer cancellation to borrowers who are at high risk of defaulting on their loans along with those who face other hardships, including high medical and caregiving expenses
- The Biden administration said it plans to start implementing some parts of the new proposal as soon as this fall, using the education secretary's authority to implement rules early in certain cases.
- The White House says it's confident the new plan is on solid legal ground, saying the Higher Education Act gives the education secretary the power to waive student loans in certain cases.

Voting Rights

• On Thursday the NC Supreme Court heard a lawsuit that would determine whether people who wrongfully accuse others of voter fraud may be sued for defamation. The suit stems from the 2016 gubernatorial election, when supporters of Republican Pat McCrory, who narrowly lost to Democrat Roy Cooper, falsely accused many Democratic voters of committing voter fraud. While the voters seeking to sue these supporters for defamation have won in lower courts, the NC Supreme Court seems likely to rule instead in favor of the Republicans who made the false accusations, a decision that lawyers for the Democratic voters say could embolden political operatives to make false voter fraud accusations in future elections.

Education Policy

 <u>Republican leaders at the NCGA are planning to allocate additional funding</u> for charter school vouchers during the next legislative session, potentially as much as \$300 million. That figure was the shortfall in the so-called Opportunity Scholarship program this year as legislation opened the program to all families, including wealthier families and those with children already in private school, bringing in a record 72,000 applications. Critics of the voucher program, including Governor Cooper, have denounced the Republicans' intention to spend hundreds of millions of dollars of taxpayer money to help rich families attend private schools while public schools aren't fully funded.

Immigration

• <u>A key Republican priority during the next legislative session beginning</u> <u>April 24 is passing legislation requiring North Carolina sheriffs to</u> <u>cooperate with US Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (ICE)</u>. This is the fourth year in a row the legislature has tried to pass such legislation. In 2019 and 2022, Governor Cooper overrode these bills with enough Democrats in the NCGA to sustain his veto, and in 2023, when Republicans would have been able to override his veto, the bill didn't get through the NC Senate before the end of the session. The bill, HB 10, would require sheriffs to hold undocumented immigrants without a warrant at the request of ICE.
