HB2 2.0: NC Republicans are back on their bathroom bullsh*t

North Carolina Republicans didn't learn their lesson in 2016, after the sweeping GOP "bathroom bill" HB2 did little else but lose North Carolina billions of dollars in income. Now, they're trying again in the Senate with SB 516, the "Women's Safety and Protection Act".

The big idea: Under SB 516, transgender individuals will not be allowed to use the bathrooms, changing rooms, or sleeping quarters of their choice in government-run buildings (like universities, schools, libraries, and more) if a cisgender person is in the room at the same time.

Why it matters: There is no evidence of transgender individuals in North Carolina enacting violence against cisgender women in bathrooms. The NCGOP is taking a far-fetched hypothetical staged in the most divisive part of today's culture battle to divide and distract voters, and they're using women as a shield to hide their real intentions.

Dig deeper: If the NCGOP cared about women, they'd be rushing to address the real problems North Carolina women are facing, instead of making up fake problems to fake solve.

Following the filling of S.B. 516 on March 25, North Carolina Democratic Party Chair Anderson Clayton released the following statement:

"North Carolina Republicans have reintroduced this decade's version of the infamous bathroom bill.' HB2, the last iteration, cost the state billions of dollars amid national backlash. This is a ploy by the Republican party to distract and divide—and doesn't do a thing to address the pressing needs that North Carolinians are feeling in their pocket books and in their schools."

"The title of the bill is 'Women's Safety and Protection Act' and that pisses me off," said Chair Anderson Clayton. "You want to protect women? How about addressing North Carolina's maternal mortality rate, which is higher than the national average. You want to protect women? 35% of North Carolina women have experienced intimate partner violence and/or sexual violence. How about you do something about that, instead of making it easier for domestic abusers to buy and carry guns? You want to protect women? The median North Carolina woman earns over \$7,500 less than the median man. Women need the government to step up in a lot of different ways. Women do not need Republicans to attack the basic human rights of our transgender community."

ICYMI: The biggest story in the national news this week was the bombshell report that dropped from Jeffrey Goldberg, editor-in-chief of The Atlantic, on Monday. Goldberg was accidentally added to a group chat by a member of Trump's national security team on the popular Internet messaging app "Signal." Members of the message thread included Vice President JD Vance, Director of National Intelligence Tulsi Gabbard, Secretary of State Marco Rubio, and Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth. Specifics

about an upcoming military operation were shared in detail, in real time, through this unsecured channel that included a member of the press.

<u>The big idea:</u> This is the kind of colossal failure of leadership that has become routine in Donald Trump's presidency. This sends a dangerous message about the fragility of our national security infrastructure.

The local angle (there is always one): Thom Tillis originally signaled that he was going to vote against Pete Hegseth's nomination for Secretary of Defense, even going so far as to encourage Hegseth's ex-sister-in-law to deliver testimony about Hegseth's history of domestic violence during his confirmation hearings. After Trump threatened Thom with a primary, he folded and voted to confirm Hegseth anyway. He cast the majority-making vote—selling out Hegseth's victims and putting a dangerous, incompetent man in charge of our nation's military operations. Pete Hegseth, and his irresponsible sharing of sensitive national security information via Signal message, would not be a problem if Thom Tillis had the spine to vote no.

<u>Updates from State Senator Natalie Murdock (Highlights)</u>

Senate Bill 50

Last week, I spoke out in opposition of Senate Bill 50: Freedom to Carry NC. This bill eliminates the current requirement to obtain a concealed carry permit in North Carolina, making it legal to carry a concealed firearm without first receiving a background check or safety training.

Law enforcement officers use concealed carry permits to differentiate between lawabiding citizens who have passed the permitting process and criminals who are carrying guns illegally. These officers have said that this bill would make their jobs more difficult and dangerous. Studies have found that states that passed legislation removing concealed carry permits have seen increases in firearm-related homicides and suicides, especially among domestic violence cases.

Most North Carolinians support gun rights AND believe in the importance of responsible gun ownership. The concealed carry permit process is not a barrier for law-abiding citizens. Clearing a basic background check, understanding the laws surrounding firearm usage, and passing a basic firearm skills test are not extreme policies but commonsense ones. Keeping North Carolinians safe is my top priority, and I will continue to fight against legislation that prioritizes guns over lives.
